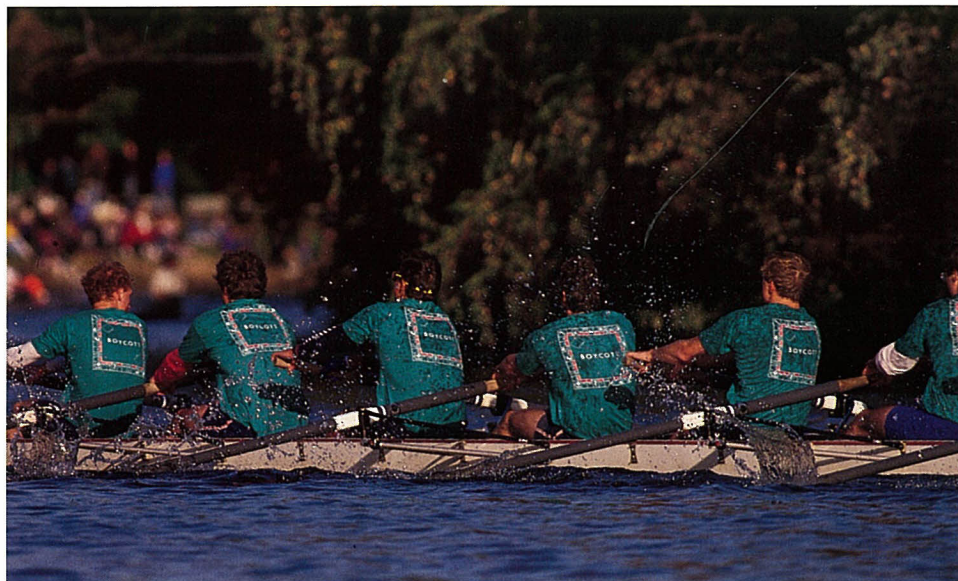

CAN YOU IMAGINE TIMING A RACE IN WHICH OVER 1,000 BOATS START AND FINISH AT SEPARATE TIMES? IN FACT, SOME SHELLS ARE JUST STARTING WHILE THE LEADERS ARE APPROACHING THE FINISH. TODAY, THE RACE COMMITTEE IS FACED WITH JUST SUCH AN ASSIGNMENT.

In the 27-year history of the Head Of The Charles, the task of timing the crews has grown in size and complexity. However, technology, experience and development have allowed us to create a system that serves the athletes, the regatta committee and the public with accurate timing information as quickly as possible with a wide distribution throughout the course. The challenges to the timers are many, as the Head Of The Charles is the largest single-day rowing event in the world. Over 1,000 boats will race in 1992, in 16 separate events, allowing each shell to be accurately "clocked."

In events such as the Boston Marathon, runners line up at the start and begin together at exactly the same "official time," despite many runners being far behind the "real" start line. Timing a marathon is done at the finish line, with all race times simply calculated from the single official starting time. Runners who are not on the physical start line when the clock begins typically subtract the time it took them to reach the start from their overall time. The Head Of The Charles timers, however, calculate both a start and finish time for each boat.

When the shells pass the starting line at the Boston University Boathouse, they are in single-file and are given approximately a ten second lead over the following boat. This is for timing purposes but also has some practical applications as well. The Charles River course is considered the most demanding head-style course in the world because it requires passing under seven bridges and negotiating several "tight turns." If the shells were allowed to start simultaneously, the Head Of The Charles would look more like a demolition derby than a boat race. However, this is not to say that there is an orderly procession to the finish line. Boats cover the course at different speeds and faster shells will frequently overtake slower ones, which

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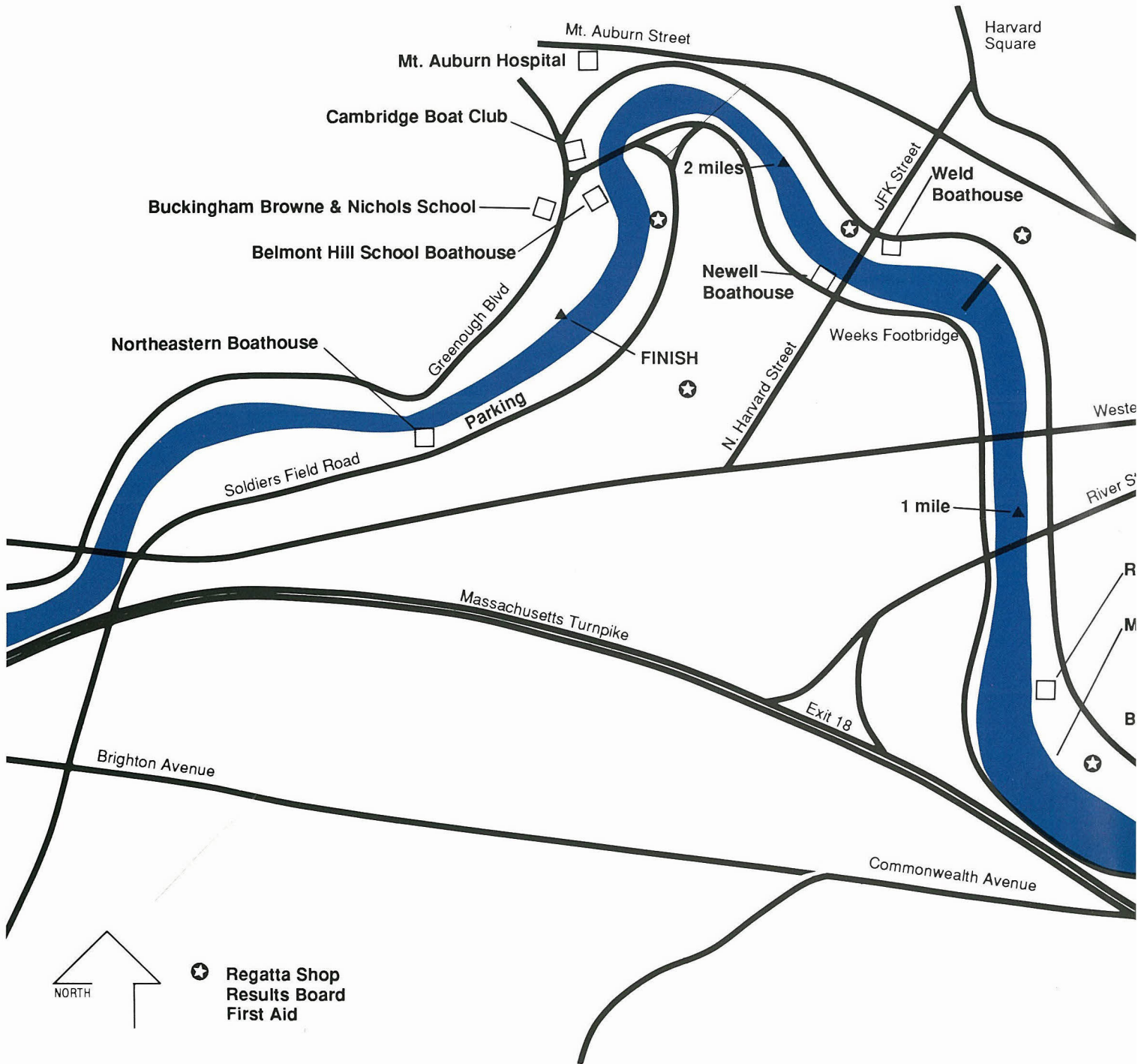
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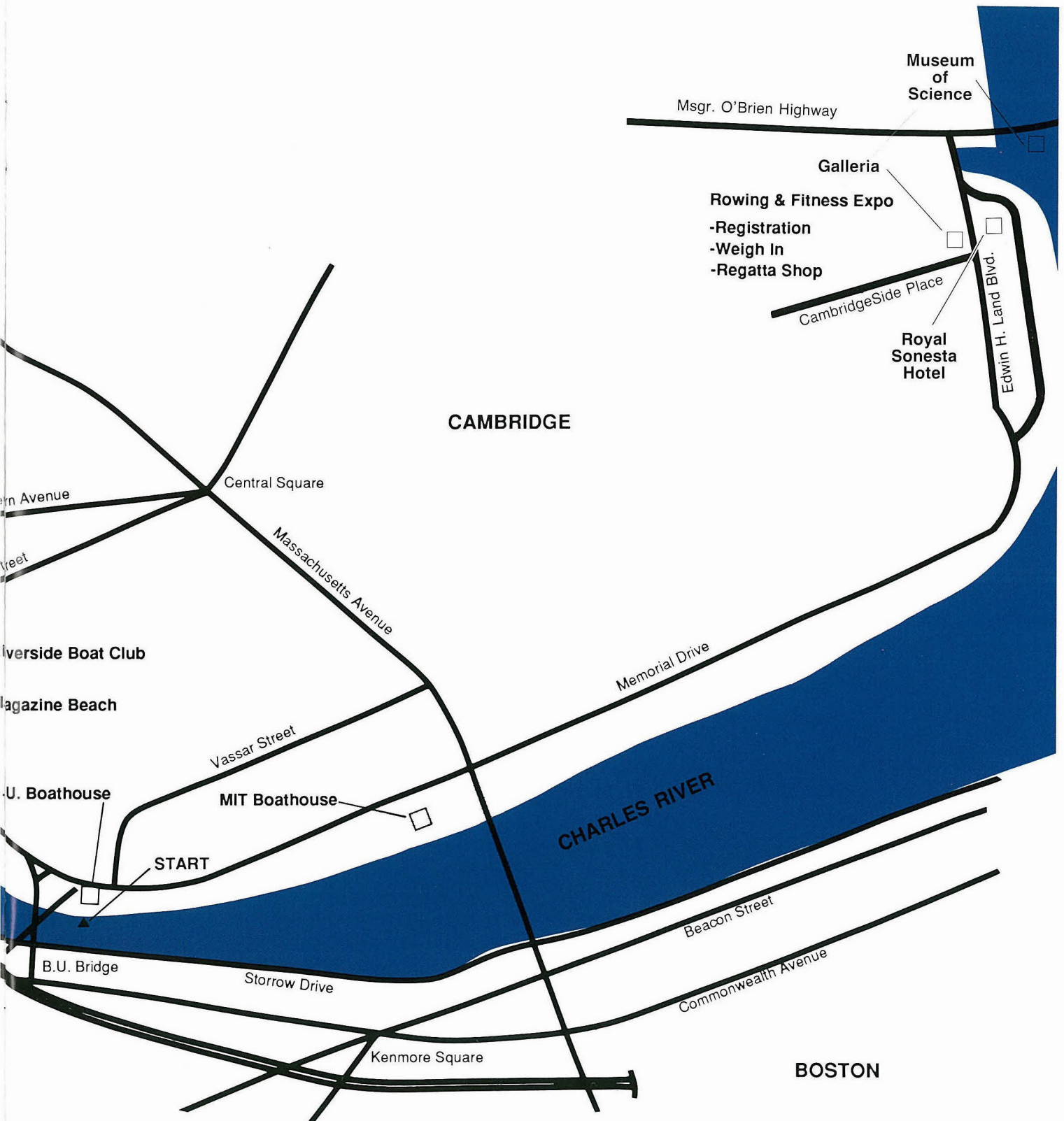

leads to fierce competition and spirited dialogue among crews on the water.

Timing a race would be easier if the shells simply raced in an oval like cars at the Indianapolis 500 or runners at a track meet. Timing the Head Of The Charles is made more difficult because the finish is three miles from the start; the start and finish timers can only communicate by phone or computer. Hence, there is a timing team at the start, to log-in an individual time for each shell, a similar team of timers at the finish to record an overall time, and a third team to calculate the differences. Today, of course, a computer will make this job easier through the use of a modem, but a back-up system of "hand timers" will still be doing it "the old fashioned way" in the event of computer

failure.

To further complicate the job of producing final or "official results," penalties are assessed to shells for travelling through the incorrect arch of a bridge or for failure to keep one of the hundreds of buoys that

mark the course on the correct side of the shell or for interference with another shell's progress. A slower crew must yield the right of way to a shell overtaking them. To assist the timers in recording these infractions, scores of umpires are stationed at strategic locations over the entire course. They report by cellular phone any wrongdoings that shall be subsequently subtracted from a shell's "official adjusted time."

In the 1960's, all racers in the Head were timed individually with stop watches and still photographs were

used for back-up if needed. Bicyclists carried the records of the start and finish times to a central point where the race times were manually calculated. This was a laborious and error-prone process that was improved by the use of an innovative set of calculation tables. However, as the number of shells increased, it was decided to make the process more automated by using computer terminals at each location to centralize the data collection.

In the 1970's, timing was calculated with a main-frame computer and terminals at each site. Stop-watch timing provided a cross-check to the computer. Results were transmitted and printed at several locations along the race course. This was an effective system but required borrowing the computer time from Harvard, which was complex and costly. Volunteers did a good job for a "once a year" event, but there were occasional difficulties. It was not unusual to have more boats finish than start because of mistakes in hitting the correct computer key. Long hours were spent comparing stop-watch and computer times to ensure accuracy. It was not

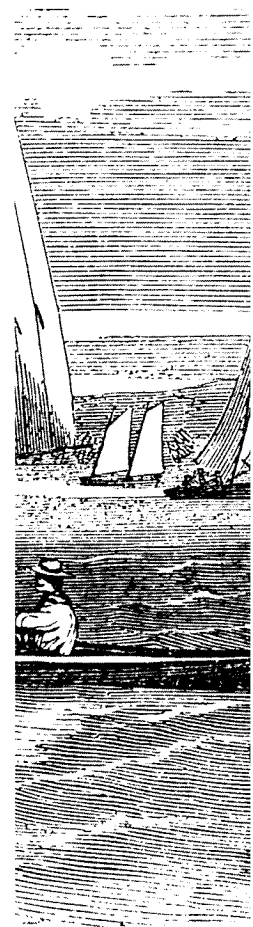

In 1937, Joseph Mahler, an oarsman who had raced on the Charles in the 1880s, recalled that “boat racing in the Eighties was like baseball is today. The City of Boston held some great regattas on the Charles River. On the Fourth of July it was not unusual for such contests to attract from 20,000 to 30,000 to see those races.” Mahler’s comparison of rowing with baseball is stunning; in 1937, baseball dwarfed all other professional sports in the United States. But a century ago, rowing was indeed a major spectator attraction. As late as the 1920s, crowds of 80,000 flocked to New London, Connecticut, to see Harvard row against Yale. Fans followed the race from special trains that rolled alongside the Thames River, keeping pace with the crews.

In the late nineteenth century, there were big turnouts for both amateur and professional regattas on the Charles. The top professional scullers were like today’s boxing champions. In the 1870s, a Canadian, Ned Hanlan (played by Nicholas Cage in the forgettable film *The Boy in Blue*) and an American, Charles Courtney, met in a series of one-on-one races that might be compared to the Ali-Frazier boxing bouts of a century later. Prize purses ran into the thousands. The match races attracted heavy wagering. Bookmakers and bettors also congregated at intercollegiate regattas—and lobbied for more entries, since that multiplied combinations for the betting pools. Professional pairs and fours raced frequently. As in boxing, high-stakes gambling inevitably corrupted the professional competition.

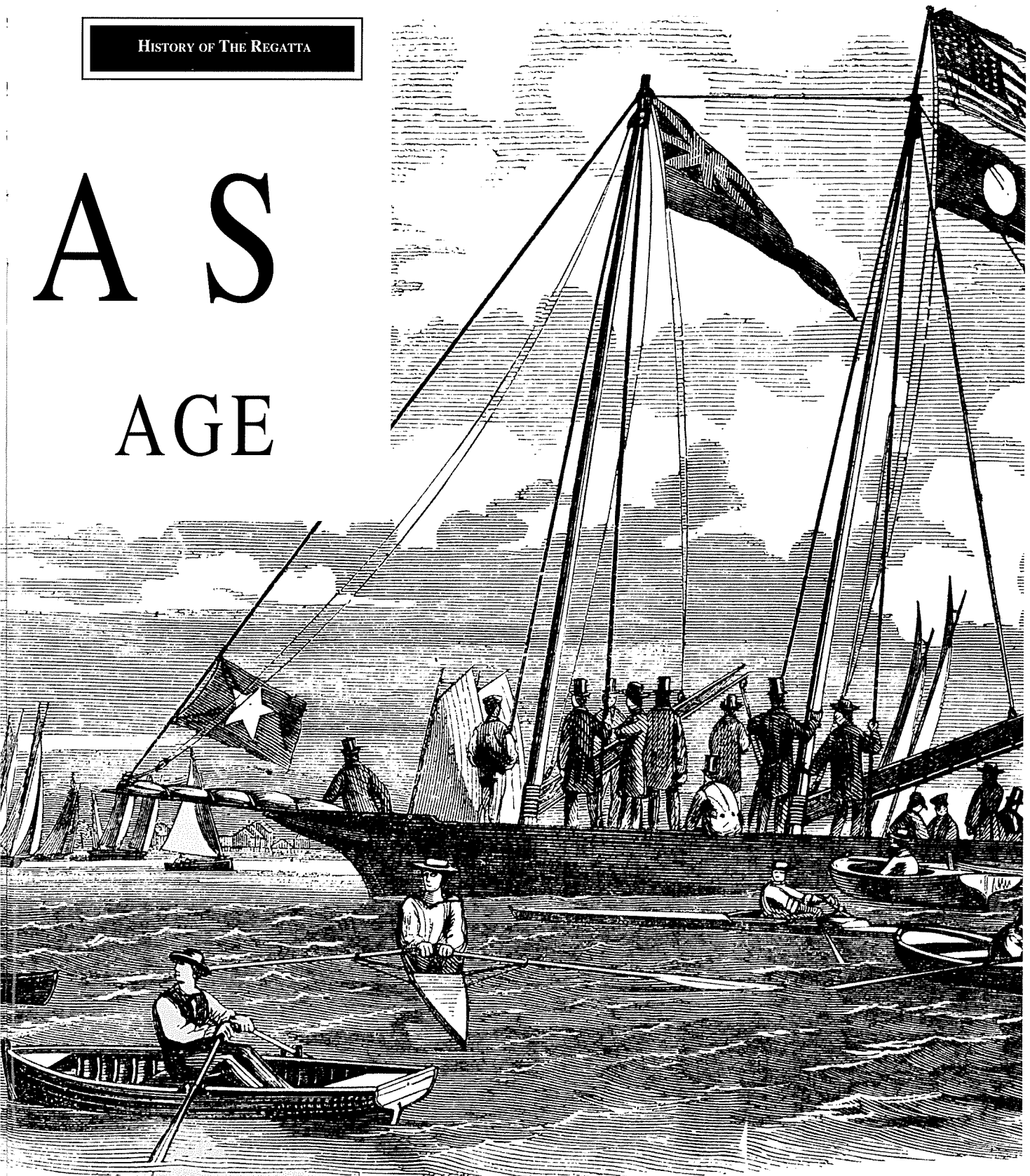
There was even some tinkering with amateur regattas. Mahler remembered rowing

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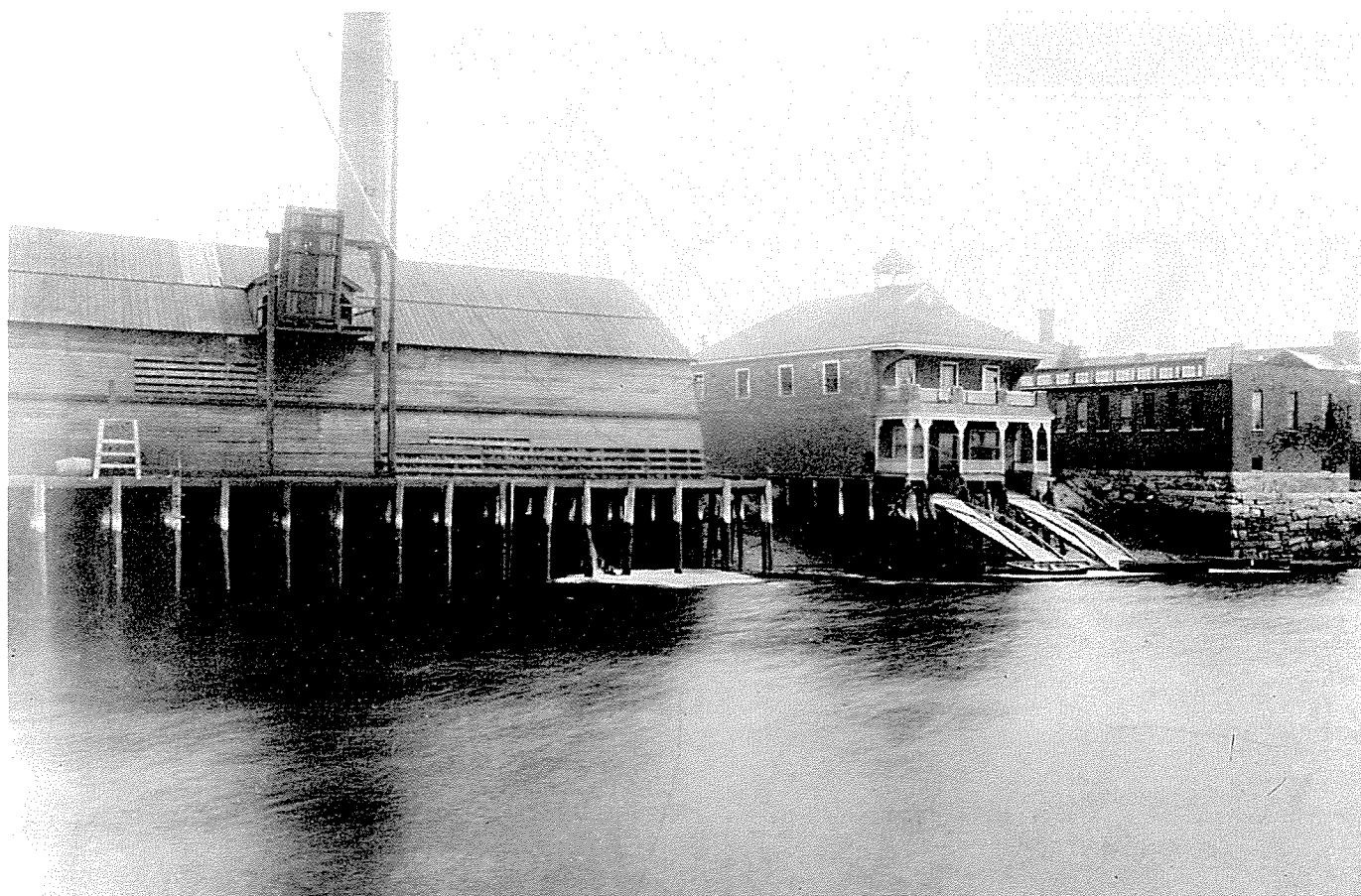
HISTORY OF THE REGATTA

for the Middlesex Amateur Crew of Cambridge in a Merrimack River race against crews from Vesper and the North End. These opponents “got to the officials,” Mahler recalled. “I’ll never forget that starter with his fog-horn voice saying, ‘Back down, Middlesex!’ Someone on our crew said, ‘what the hell does he want?’ I said that he won’t start this race unless the other crews get a handicap. Then I got the starter’s goat when I yelled that if he would send word down to the boathouse, we would start from there—when he would probably start the race still crying, ‘Back down, Middlesex!’ But I told our crew to back down and we were halfway through a stroke when he said, ‘GO!’ That was what he was waiting for, and they stole a length or more while we were backing down. We still caught them after a half mile and won.”

On the Charles, there were some friendly brushes between professional and amateur crews. Mahler told of a day when his four “rowed over to the Union Boat House and right after us came the West

End professional crew, with George Hosmer rowing stroke and Dan Breen rowing bow. Hosmer said, ‘What’s the matter with a race?’

‘Not a thing, George,’ we said, as we were just ‘raring to go.’

He said, ‘Who will start us?’

‘You can do that.’

‘Ready—go!’ he said, and they were off.

“We went after them and it took a quarter of a mile to get even with them. We had some boat race in that next quarter. Our stroke, Touchet, was rowing 56 strokes a minute. Hosmer was building up the stroke so fast that Dan Breen was calling to George to lengthen the stroke as they couldn’t follow him. As we rowed away from them we heard someone say, ‘let her run,’ but you can bet it was not George Hosmer, who was as game a fellow as ever rowed in a boat race. You can imagine how we felt right then, outrowing one of

unusual for crews to leave the regatta without knowing how they placed.

In the 1980's, with improved technology, new systems were developed and timing teams were organized in a way that required less equipment spread over the entire race course. Objectives were, and continue to be, accuracy, speed, and wide distribution of the results. The personal computer became the key timing device because of its power, reliability and user-friendliness. Other machines such as faxes, cellular phones, and hand-held radios have accelerated the process and made the task far easier. In the late 80's, timing subcontractors were brought in to assist the timers; today Spitler Timing Systems Inc. will be the primary timing system used to determine the results.

In the 1990's we continue to expand our use of new

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technologies and to explore new possibilities. Attempted for the first time in 1992 will be a mid-course ranking. Crews will be timed from the start to Weld Boathouse, instantly and unofficially ranked, whereupon results will be passed along to

announcers upstream, providing information and excitement to the expectant crowd of well-wishers.

In the future, bar code scanners, transponders on each boat, and similar devices have the potential to make timing even more accurate and dependable. In turn, this will allow the Race Committee to continue to provide excellent service to the athletes, the public, and the sport of rowing. Today however, hand-timers still provide that all-important back-up for the computer and bicyclists will still carry times to result boards around the course, so gentlemen, start your watches!

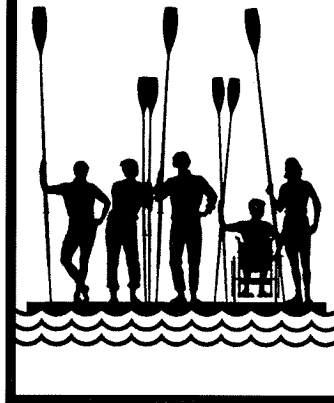

CLUB: Limited to individuals, including coxswains, who in any sculling or sweep-oared event except Masters or Veterans since October 1st of the preceding calendar year did compete beyond the quarter-finals of the Henley Royal Regatta or finish among the top six places in any of the following regattas:

San Diego Crew Classic, Dad Vail, EARC, EAWRC, Western Sprints, Head Of The Charles, national or international or world championships, (e.g. Lucerne Rotsee, Olympics, Pan-Am games)

IRA, PAC-10, Dad Vail, or any national team trials.

SENIOR VETERAN: At least 70 years old.

VETERAN: At least 60 years old, 8 seconds per year over 60 handicap.

YOUTH: Persons under 20 years old, including coxswains.

GRAND MASTER: At least 50 years old.

LIGHTWEIGHT SINGLES: Mens' maximum weight of 160 lbs., Women's maximum weight of 130 lbs.

LIGHTWEIGHT CREWS: Men: average weight below 160 lbs., no one over 170 lbs. Women: average weight below 130 lbs., no one over 138 lbs.

MEN'S DIVISION: Male rowers and scullers only.

WOMEN'S DIVISION: Female rowers and scullers only.

CHAMPIONSHIP: Open, no performance restrictions.

FOURS AND EIGHTS: Must be sweep oared, with coxswain.

SINGLES AND DOUBLES: Sculling, no coxswain.

COXSWAINS: May be of either sex, but must weigh at least 100 lbs, or carry weight in the boat to weigh 100 lbs.

SENIOR MASTER: At least 40 years old

MASTER: At least 30 years old, in addition, a master crew must average 40 years old, not including coxswain.

the best professional crews in New England. George Hosmer as a sculler could make Ned Hanlan, the champ, keep going in high to beat him."

Professional crews from New York and Boston raced in the Boston City regatta on the morning of July 4th, and then raced in Providence, Rhode Island, that afternoon. The Boston City regatta, like today's Head of the Charles, included events for a wide variety of boats: there were races for single and double sculls, pair-oared and four-oared shells, single and four-oared "working boats," and even a barge race. In the earlier decades of the century, college crews often rowed six-oared shells; Harvard and Yale did not race in coxed eights until 1876. Their 1855 race pitted eight, six, and four-oared boats against each other, with a handicap of 11 seconds per oar given to the smaller boats over a three-mile course. (Harvard's eight won.)

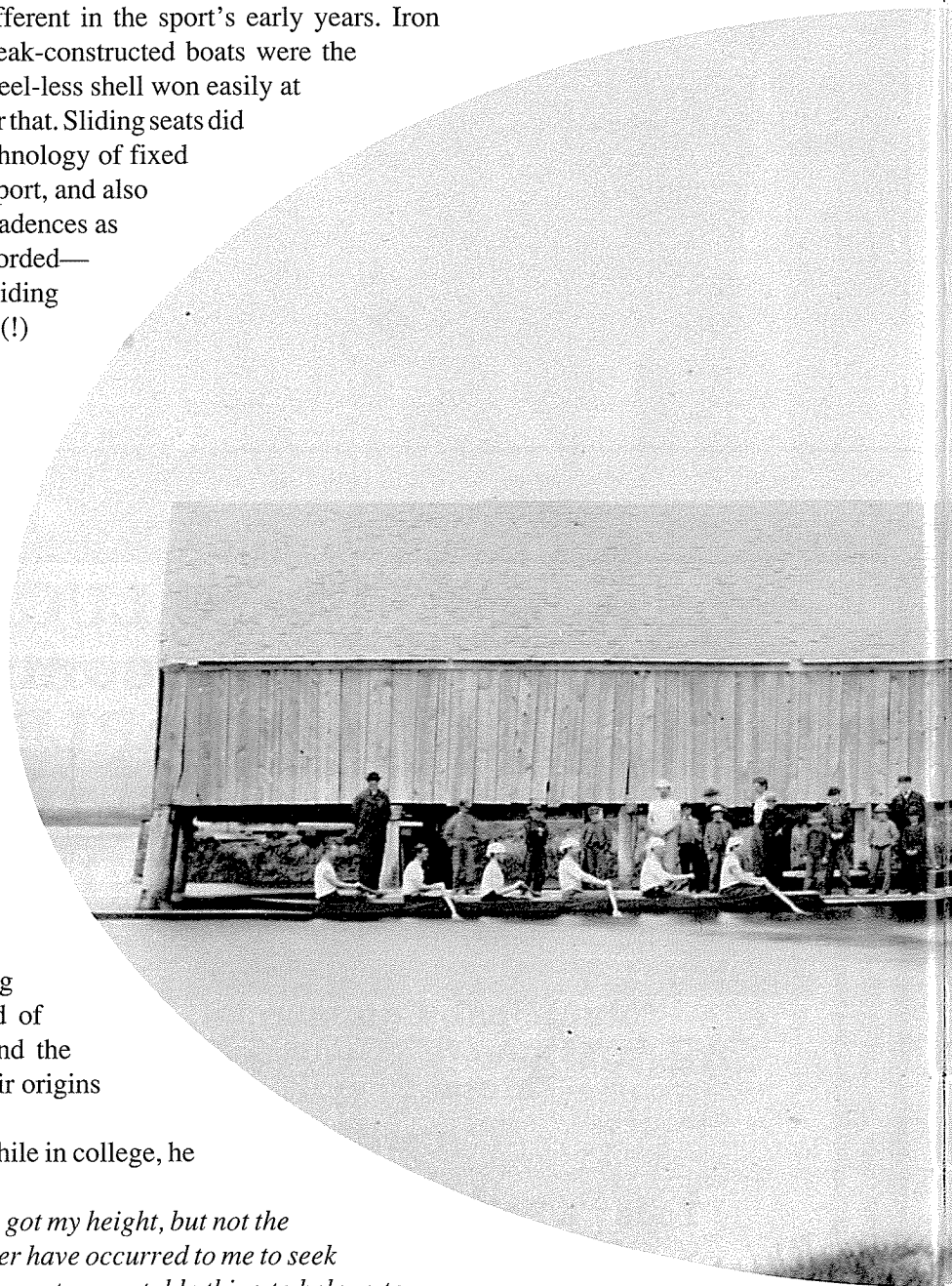
Aspects of the equipment were different in the sport's early years. Iron outriggers appeared in 1846. Heavy lapstreak-constructed boats were the norm until 1856, when a round-bottomed, keel-less shell won easily at Henley; shells quickly gained popularity after that. Sliding seats did not emerge until the 1870s. The earlier technology of fixed seats made rowing more of an upper-body sport, and also allowed higher stroke rates. Extraordinary cadences as high as sixty strokes per minute were recorded—although Mahler, presumably rowing on sliding seats in the 1880s, reports taking it up to 56 (!) in the scrimmage described above.

From about 1850 to 1870 the Mecca of rowing in North America was St. John, New Brunswick; American boat clubs and colleges looked to St. John for instruction in rowing form and in boat building. In *EMDULØThe H Book of Harvard Athletics* *EMDNMØ* (1923), Charles W. Eliot, Harvard president from 1869-1909, notes the launching in 1858 of a six-oared shell built in St. John, "the first shell boat to appear on the Charles." On June 19 of that year, Eliot raced in that shell with a crew wearing red bandana handkerchiefs on their heads as a distinguishing mark. This was the first appearance of crimson as a Harvard color and, according to Eliot, the first occasion of any college team identifying itself with a color. Thus the blue-and-gold of Michigan, the Big Green of Dartmouth, and the Crimson Tide of Alabama can all trace their origins to an obscure 1858 regatta on the Charles.

In his memoir, Eliot observes that while in college, he

"was not fit for any strenuous sport, for I had got my height, but not the proper weight; but if I had been, it would never have occurred to me to seek access to the "Harvard crew"; because it was not a reputable thing to belong to that crew. The boats of those days were strong lapstreak boats with a real floor on the inside, which could be used, and were used both spring and fall, as a means of bringing home

members of the crew who did not propose to return sober from an evening in Boston. Two or three members were expected to bring the rest from Boston to Cambridge, and to get them out of the boat up to the floor of the rough, open boathouse.

Indeed, the "recreational rowers" of the 1840s and 1850s—at least those at Harvard College—used a liberal definition of that term. The H Book of Harvard Athletics observes that until 1856 the boats were seldom used for racing, but partially for exercise and principally for rows upstream to the famous Spring Hotel near the Watertown Dam or down the Charles to Boston, where often all the college boats would be tied up at Braman's Baths, near the foot of Chestnut Street, or to the adjacent stone walls, while the crews visited the theaters, Ripley's billiard hall, or went to Parker's for supper.

In those days college rowing centered on boat clubs; the first one at Harvard began in 1844. Several undergraduates would pool resources to buy a boat and usually the name of the boat was also the club name. One example was the six-oared Oneida, winner of the first Harvard-Yale boat race in 1852, the first intercollegiate athletic contest in the United States.

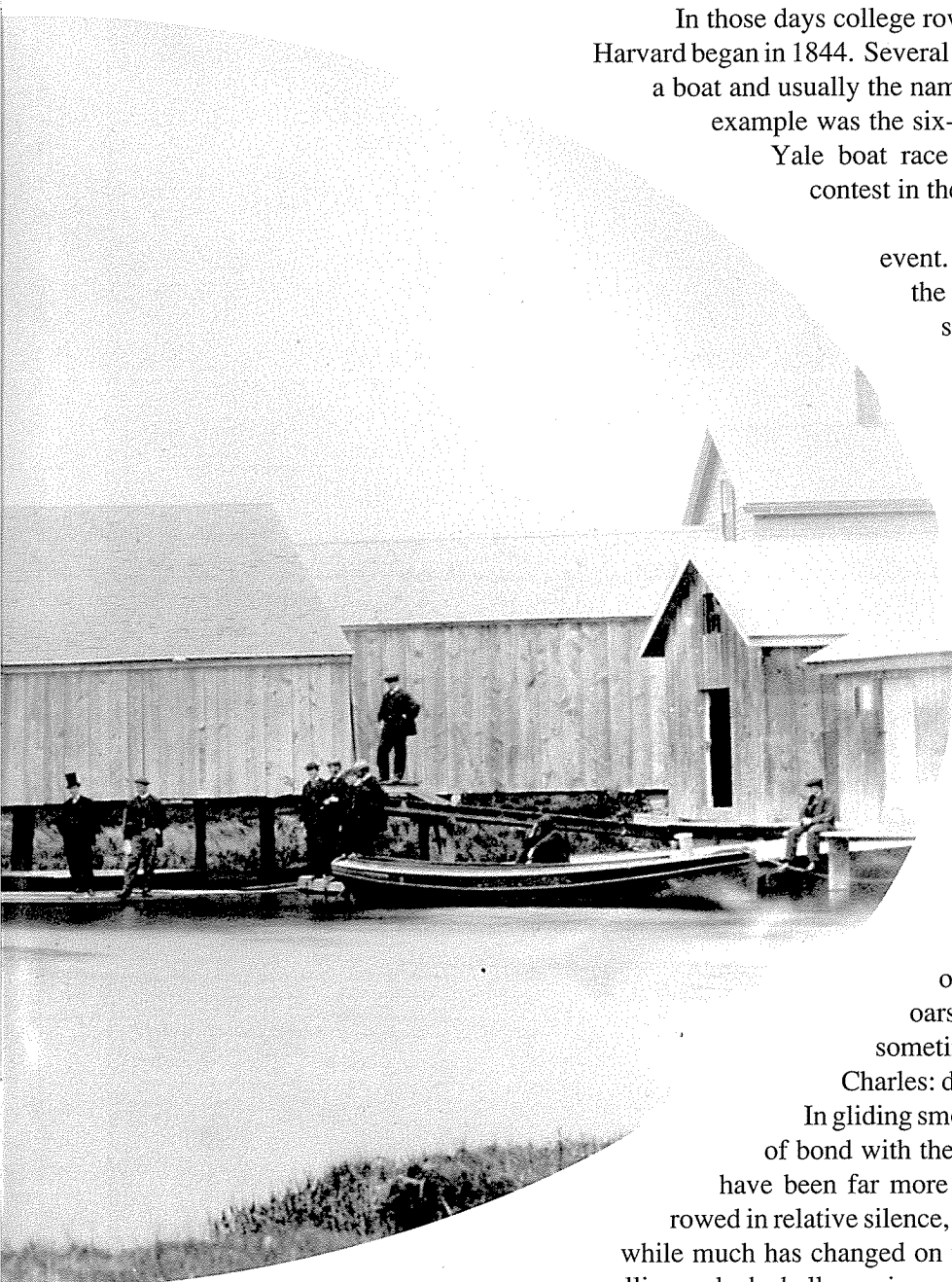
The "evening row" was an important social event. Each club would boat its best rowers and fly the club flag from bow and stern. There was a spot of bother in 1850 when the Ariel club's crew got into a ruckus with the Boston Police that ended with the fire department being called out and the crew thrown in jail. As a result, the Harvard faculty banned the formation of any new boat clubs for several years afterwards.

The faculty had taken another interesting action in 1839 when it disciplined a student for keeping a boat on Fresh Pond. He had been using it for shooting. The faculty censured him for violating a college rule against keeping domestic animals. Within the meaning of the rule, said the professors, a boat was an animal.

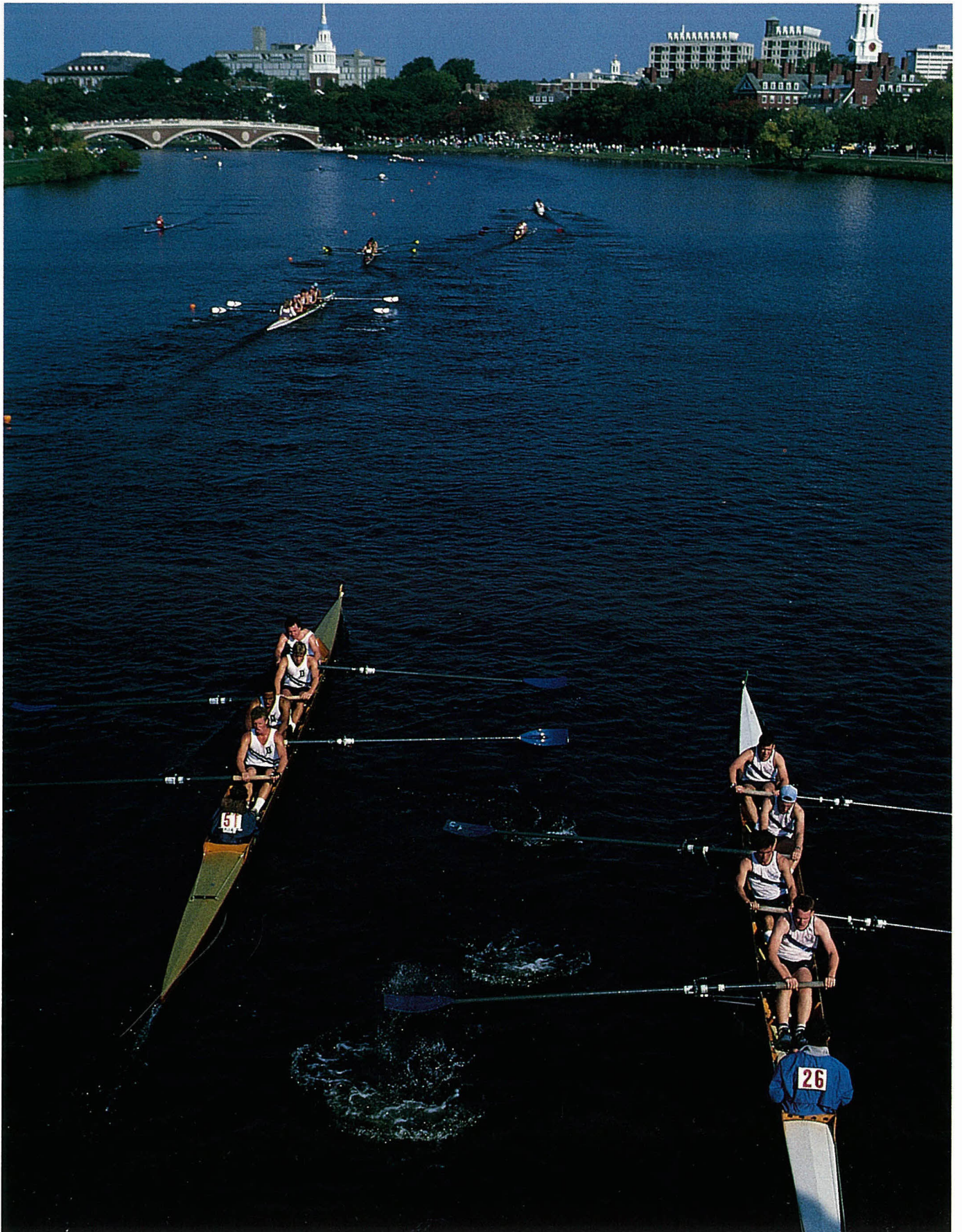
Perhaps the Harvard authorities were on to something. A boat, particularly one occupied by a human being and propelled by oars, is a kind of animal. Other aquatic species sometimes come into play during a row on the Charles: ducks, swans, the occasional swimming dog.

In gliding smoothly through the water, there is even a type of bond with the unseen fish. The natural connection must have been far more profound a hundred years ago, when one rowed in relative silence, without the riparian roar of auto traffic. Yet, while much has changed on the Charles in the last century, a fine crew propelling a sleek shell remains perhaps the most beautiful animal of all.
