



Foreign Crews add to the world's largest regatta

The Growing International Presence

ver since the first
Head Of The
Charles was held
thirty years ago,
international crews have
been drawn to what is now
the largest single-day rowing
event in the world. The
international tradition continues today, as a recordnumber of foreign entries
will race from the Boston
University boathouse to
Herter Park in the 31st edition of the regatta.

The first foreign crew to compete in the Head Of The Charles, Toronto's Argonaut Rowing Club, raced in the inaugural regatta in 1965, finishing fourth of five in the Championship Fours. It was an inauspicious start for a club that would go on to several titles in various events over the years, most recently the women's lightweight fours at last year's race.

International Presence

The first overseas entry came from England in 1967 when Adrian Wood from King's College, Cambridge raced in the Lightweight Single, beating two other scullers to place ninth. Subject to the same rules as domestic competitors, first-time foreign boats race at the back of the starting order, after the boats which earn starting positions based on the previous finish order. Racing through a dozen or more wakes on a river as twisted as the Charles for the first time provides a tough initiation for new crews.

In the 1970s, Canadian crews began to take notice of the race, entering and eventually winning events in significant numbers. Ottawa Rowing Club and University of Western Ontario joined the fray in 1970, followed by St. Catharines and Ridley in 1973. Ridley Graduates won the men's Championship Eight an amazing four straight years, after breaking the Naval Academy's streak of the same length in 1984. St. Catharines, in addition to many individual wins, owned the women's Championship Double title from 1985 until 1988, while their lightweight men's eight hold the record for consecutive wins in team boats

with five, from 1980 through 1985 (a record the women of Boston Rowing Center tied last year).

A then-record 12 different Canadian clubs entered in 1977, fully establishing a presence at the regatta that has continued to grow. St. Catharines Rowing Club and Cambridge Boat Club are now sister clubs and today Canadian rowers make up 20 percent of all entrants.

The '80s brought both the expansion of countries represented and the speed of those crews. The unfor-

tunate boycott of the 1980 Moscow Olympic Games led not only to the formation of the Charles River's 1980 Rowing Club but also the entry of several internation al crews left out of the Olympics by their governments. In addition to the Australian crews racing in the 1980 regatta, West Germany was represented by three eights and single sculler B. Riechmann.

Despite racing from the back of the starting order, Riechmann was still able to finish second to Charles River legend Tiff Wood, who was in the middle of his three year reign in the Championship Single. George Simeon, from the Belgian club C.R. Bruxelles, also did well from the back of the pack, finishing seventh.

The West German eight entered in the 1980 women's Championship event represented the first overseas women's entry, finishing 10th of 40 in the eight year-old event. The other West German eights, Osnabrucker RC and Deutscher Ruderverein, did well in men's Championship event. Osnabrucker finished highest, behind the winning Navy crew (on their way to a four year title run) but ahead of hometown Harvard. Deutscher Ruderverein took seventh.

Three years later, Swiss sculler F. Bachmann won the Master Singles, defeating Head of the Charles Trustee Steve Carr, who today helps oversee the administration of the regatta. Xeno Müller's win in last year's Championship Single gave Switzerland its second sculling title. Canada's Marnie McBean, world and Olympic champion in both sweep and sculling events, took advantage of seventime champion Anne Marden's absence last year in winning the women's Championship Single.

In the decades leading up to this year's record for foreign entries, overseas entries have given some great performances. In 1989, Great Britain's men's open and lightweight national eights, entered as Tideway Scullers and Nottinghamshire County, respectively, charged through much of the pack to place

second and third behind Philadelphia's perennially fast Penn AC. Buckingham Browne and Nichols School's Larry Cabot hosted a Youth Eight entry from Russia's Znamya in 1991. After finding Cabot's credit limit when he treated them to a shopping spree at the local New Balance shoe outlet, the Russian juniors narrowly lost to a Harvard eight. Other international junior crews have also been treated well by their hosts, who are often local college coaches happy to meet fast, young rowers.





International Presence

Dresdner Ruderverein E.V. (Germany) were the lone overseas winners in team boat events last year, taking the Club Fours by just over one second. In addition to Müller, Switzerland was well represented by Zürich's Grasshopper Club in the Championship Eights. Sons of the Thames, one of England's venerable London clubs, raced with the Cairo Police in the Championship Eight. Cairo Police, who are what their name suggests, also raced in the men's Championships Double with Croatia's AVK Mladost. All three are entered in

the same events today. This year, both the men's and women's Championship Eights trophies could very well clear customs at Logan come Monday morning. The Dutch National Team open men's and women's eights, medalists at this summer's World Championships in Tampere, Finland, will both race on the Charles. Also entered in the women's race is Nautilus Boat Club, from England. The men's Championship Eight will be contested among several overseas crews along with the many North American boats entered.

Also entered in the

Championship Eight event, Club Nautico de Sevilla will represent Spain. Made up of lightweight oarsmen from the Spanish National Team, the club is grateful to their national federation, which will allow them to take this weekend off from training in Georgia in preparation for the Olympic Games. At this summer's World Championships, both the Spanish lightweight straight four and double finished high enough to qualify for the 1996 Olympic Games and will spend October training on Lake Lanier, site of the Olympic rowing venue. Sevilla's spares will race in the Championship Double. Mainzer Ruderverein, located on the confluence of the Main and Rhine Rivers in Germany, will also race in the men's Championship Eight. Mainzer Ruderverein, part of the mighty German club system (arguably the strongest in the world), feeds the perennially mighty German National Team, which won more medals then any other nation at both the junior and senior World Championships this summer.

Although the regatta now has men's and women's divisions in all events, overseas entries are yet to show the same equity. Aside from the aforementioned Championships Eights, only three other women's events will include overseas entries. The Dutch Rowing Federation has an entry in the Championship Doubles along with their two eights. Another Dutch club, K.R.Z.V. Het Spaarne, will compete in the Club Eights, for sub-championship crews. Galway Rowing Club's women's four passed twelve boats to finish tenth in the Club Fours event last year. Since their time was only 3.9 percent off the winners, their entry this year was guaranteed. Galway will also bring two men's crews, a Championship Double and Club Four.


This year, a crew from Japan will again race in the men's Lightweight Eight. The Tohoku University Crew Club will come from Sendai, cradle of rowing in Japan. Sendai crews have represented Japan at both the 1960 Rome Olympic Games and the 1976 and '77 World Championships.

Part of the growing master's field that precipitated the addition of more master categories in today's race are several overseas entries. A.S.R. Nereus, in addition the their Championship Eight entry, will race in the men's Master Eight. England's Upper Thames and Mortlake Anguan & Alpha Boat Club compete in the same event. The men's Master Fours this year includes Austria's Albatros Klagenfurt and Britain's Molesey Boat Club.

Reciprocating the trend of American crews traveling to England's rowing pageant, the Henley Royal Regatta, several British schools will make the trip to compete in today's race. The boys of Fitzwilliam College, Latymer Upper School, Norwich School, The King's School, and Westminister School will all gain admission to the tents, even without their blazers and ties

From the single Canadian boat in 1965 through the recent proliferation of overseas crews, the number of foreign entries today illustrates how the regatta has grown. No longer just America's fall rowing classic, the Head Of The Charles is now also the world's, attracting some of the best international crews to three miles of the Charles that challenge and reward over 4500 athletes every year.

From the Beginning

A sculler heads for the day's first race - club singles - toward the triangular start bouys across from

t 7:06 a.m. the sun comes up over the Charles River. The first rays of light create a dappling effect on the surface as you survey the Starting Line and fight back the butterflies in your stomach.

It's 7:15 a.m. as you slide your boat into the murky water to begin your warm-up for the Club Singles race — the first event of the day. You head for the group of scullers circling like a school of confused fish in the warm-up area. You begin to work the kinks out of your arms and shoulders, and you feel the warmth building in your quadriceps with each successive stroke.

In the distance you notice a member of the course committee in his launch fine-tuning the placement of some of the more than 600 racing lane buoys which define the course.

Then a Starter's voice barks out the ten-minute warning over the PA system at 7:40 a.m. and for some reason the sound of the Star Spangled Banner is making your adrenaline rush like never before.

Your heart is pounding now as the Starter shouts "first boats in Club Singles queue up at the open end of the gauntlet." The numbered boats are getting into sequence for the running start just as the five-minute warning is sounded. "Gentlemen, complete your warm-ups..." Then you're told to "build to half speed!" And then, "build to three-quarter speed!"

At 7:48 a.m. the "Rules of Racing" are bellowed out to the competitors, telling you to keep two to three lengths of open water between your shell and the one in front of you as you cross the Starting Line... and that no passing is permitted prior to the BU Bridge.

Finally, just as you've maneuvered into your assigned slot, you hear the voice atop the BU Boathouse say, "proceed to full speed at your pleasure!" and you explode with all the power you can muster.

Next thing you know, you're across the starting line — your arms straining against the resistance of the water,

your legs pumping in cadence, and the sweat breaking on your brow as you begin to negotiate the serpentine, three-mile course. It is exactly 7:50 a.m.

This is what it'll be like — from the racer's perspective — at the start of the 31st Head Of The Charles regatta on October 22nd.

Less than nineteen minutes later, the race is all over for the first boat. But for the people behind the scenes at the Starting Line, the craziness has just begun.

Before the Start

Sixteen major events are held on that day between 7:50 a.m. and 4:50 p.m., before the day is done, 1,102 boats and 4,512 competitors will have crossed the starting line — in sequence — and as you can imagine, sound planning, precise timing and great teamwork are crucial.

"A good, clean start for each of the 16 events is the goal of the Starting Line Team," says Fred Schoch, Executive Director of the Head Of The Charles regatta, "and it's a great deal more complicated than one might think."

The planning begins long before race day, when the sixteen events are scheduled. "One key challenge," says Schoch, "is to make sure that the events are properly scheduled so that one race, as it is ending — is not overtaken by the leading boats from the next race."

"For example, the slowest race is the Veteran Singles, because the average age of the athletes in this race is in the mid-sixties. The Veteran Singles are followed by the Youth Fours, which are quite a bit faster. The Starting Line Team has to make sure that the

It's kind of like herding cats.

Fours event is held back at the starting line so that it doesn't start too soon after the Veterans have stopped starting, creating the chance that it would start stopping before the Vets have stopped stopping at the finish line. Got it?"

All sixteen events are further split into Men's and Women's divisions. Men start first, followed by a two to four-minute hiatus, then the Women's division begins. Within the Men's and Women's divisions there are further segregations based on crews that are over 30 years of age (Masters) or under 30. It can get confusing, to say the least.

"Over the years, it has been much easier to start the Women's races than the Men's," according to Raoul Attager, longtime volunteer at the Starting Line. "The women are more composed as a group while the men's races tend to be more troublesome to deal with at the Starting Line." (Sorry, guys.)

On the roof

The challenge of organizing the start is undertaken by a team of volunteers who set up shop at the Boston University boathouse, a venerable old structure that sits on the river's edge just east of the BU Bridge. Boston University is a very generous host to the Regatta each year, allowing the Starting Line Team to build a temporary partition in the upstairs weight room of their Boathouse. The Boathouse becomes the "Operations Base" for the two dozen volunteers who will staff the Starting Line throughout the day.

Inside the boathouse, two dedicated 20-amp circuits are in place providing current for two PC's, a FAX machine, three amplifiers, six speakers and a coffee machine. A dozen stop watches from TAG-Heuer are in use here, and a large master clock display keeps everyone focused on the task at hand.

Here, there are two teams in place. The Computer Timing group, comprised of four people, will call each shell's bow number as it crosses the line — entering into the timing log the Start Time for each sculler or crew. A second team of eight "Hand-Timers" with stop watches will manually track and log every boat, providing a backup capability in the event of any high-tech glitches.

Outside, on the adjacent roof of the boathouse, a 16x 16-foot deck is erected for the weekend, providing a platform for the Starting Line equipment, including the public address system, as well as the starters, boat spotters, a course umpire, radio operators, audio technicians and assorted people-watchers who are assembled to call the crews to the line. A canopy is put in place to protect the team from the elements, and a picket fence is there to keep them from taking a nasty dive off the roof.

Event Classifications

Championship: Open, no restrictions on rowers or scullers.

Club: Limited to persons (including coxswains) who in any sculling or sweep-oared event ("master" or "veteran" events excepted) did not finish high enough to earn a medal (("special" medals excepted)) in the preceding year's Head Of The Charles regatta, or during the current calender year did not compete beyond the quaterfinals of the Henley Royal Regatta or finish among the top six places in any of the following regattas: San Diego Crew Classic, Dad Vail, EARC or EAWRC Sprints, Pacific Coast Rowing Championships, IRA, Canadian Henley, any national, international or world Championships or any national team trials.

Coxswains: May be of either sex, but must weigh at least 100 lbs, or carry weight in the boat to weigh 100 lbs.

Fours and eights: Must be sweep-oared, with coxswain.

Grand Master: At least 50 years old.

Lightweight Crews: Men must average below 160 lbs, no one over 170 lbs. Women must average 130 lbs. no one over 138 lbs.

Lightweight Singles: Men's maximun weight of 160 lbs, womens' maximum weight of 130 lbs.

Master: At least 30 years old; in addition, a master crew must average at least 40 years old, not including the coxswain.

Men's Division: Male rowers and sculler only.

Senior Master: At least 40 years old. Senior Veteran: At least 70 years old.

Singles and doubles: Sculling, no coxswain.

Veteran: At least 60 years old, 8 seconds per year over 60 handicap.

Women's Division: Female rowers and scullers only.

Youth: Persons under 20 years old, including coxswain.

Handle with CAUTION!



From the Start



The apparent chaos in the Starting Line Operations Base is nothing compared to the ruckus on the water. Crews circle nervously in their warm-up mode as they wait from instructions from the Starters above. Marshall boats try to keep order, communicating with Starting Line officials via two-way radio.

These Marshall boats are small motor launches borrowed from BU, MIT, Northeastern, Radcliffe, Harvard and other schools. Three or four of these boats patrol the Starting Line, each staffed with a Driver, one or two spotters, and a Marshall from the United States Rowing Association.

They patrol the area of the Upper Basin, upstream of Massachusetts Avenue Bridge. Their job is to guide the boats into the 150-yard long gauntlet at the start, which is made up of buoys in the shape of a funnel.

At the Start

Just getting boats to the Starting Line in the correct sequence can be, let's say, a major challenge.

"It's kind of like herding cats," says John Romain, a veteran volunteer with the Head Of The Charles since 1984. Romain serves as one of the two Starters this year, along with his colleague Bill Becklean (the coxswain in the Yale

eight that won Olympic gold in Melbourne in 1956).

"These Marshall boats literally corral the competitors into the gauntlet," Romain says. "Marshalls must resolve any last minute crew disputes or problems, help some crews with any fixable equipment damage, and generally keep the crews herded upstream towards the finish line."

"If a crew has an equipment failure at this time, and the coxswain or sculler can get the boat to the BU dock and manage a quick repair, they are in real luck. If a crew is late to the Starting Line due to a mental lapse or problem, they will not be permitted to jump right into the sequence. They will be told to wait and start LAST in their division."

"This policy," adds Fred Schoch, "has met with the strong approval or both coaches and participants. After all, if 1,000 other boats can manage to get to the starting line on time, you should, too."

A crew may receive a 15-second penalty if it crosses the Starting Line outside of the Racing Lane. This is called a buoy violation. A crew may also be assessed a penalty by the Marshalls or the Starter if they refuse to comply with instructions, such as getting too close to the crew they follow without easing off. "Each crew is entitled to a clean start," Romain says with convic-

tion. But this is more easily said than done.

There can be up to three different events on the course at one time totally as many as 360 shells: one warming up, one starting and one finishing and returning.

At the start of each event, all competing boats are identified by the Starter by name. Each boat has a bow marker indicating its starting sequence in its Event Division. This starting order is established either by a past performance in last year's event or by lottery if a sculler or crew is new to an event. Scullers and crews have the responsibility to locate the boat that precedes them, and once having done so, to follow Last year's US Lwt 8+ gets a good start off the line in the 1994 Regatta. that boat to the Starting Line.

Occasionally, competitors scratch from the competition at the last minute. All racers are advised of the scratches in their race, having them leapfrog over the missing boat, and stay in sequence. "It requires a fair amount of concentration — and a lot of patience," says the veteran Starter.


All day long Starters Romain and Becklean are exhorting the crews, shouting directions — and always — watching the clock. From 40 feet above the river, the Starting Line Team controls the action, ensuring fairness and safety for all competitors.


After the Start




When the last event of the day is done, the Start Team breaks down their base. The donut boxes and stale coffee are thrown out, the temporary doors and partition are removed, PA systems are unplugged, PC's and FAXes are disconnected, and the portable phones and two-way radios are inventoried for return on Monday.


Weary, hoarse but with a feeling of accomplishment, the Starting Line Team can go home, confident in the knowledge that 4,512 competitors have received a fair start.


From the Executive Director

This year is no exception. Outstanding leadership during 1995 from K. C. King and Roger Borggaard has kept the event on focus and we thank them both for hundreds of hours of time and creativity in overseeing the ten race chairs and thirty-two sub-chairs which make up event's organizational flow chart.


